

BEACH FLAGS



Always swim between the RED and YELLOW flags.



RED FLAG:
No swimming.



YELLOW FLAG:
Caution required. Potential Hazards.



RED AND WHITE FLAG:
Evacuate the water.



BLACK AND WHITE FLAG:
Surfcraft riding area boundary.

Every beach has permanent and occasional hazards that you will need to look out for. Lifesaving services use safety flags to help identify these hazards and to indicate supervised areas.

- 1) Iconic **red** and **yellow** flags: these show the supervised areas of the beach that our volunteer surf lifesavers are operating at. The absence of red and yellow flags indicates there is no supervision.
- 2) **Red Flag**: a red flag tells us that the beach is closed, and you should not enter the water.
- 3) **Yellow Flag**: a yellow flag indicates there are potential hazards in the water and caution is required.
- 4) **Red and White Flag**: a red and white flag signals for you to evacuate the water immediately.
- 5) **Black and White Flag**: a black and white chequered flag indicates an area where surfing and board riding is not permitted.
